GENERAL COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This nursing practice experience provides opportunities to develop caring relationships with groups, families and individuals across the lifespan. Emphasis is placed on health assessment and coming to know how clients understand and promote their health, and the role of the nurse in partnering with the client in this process. Learners work with groups, families and individuals in the home and community, in agencies, and in care facilities to incorporate concepts and learning from all the courses in this semester into their nursing practice.

Program Information: This course is required for the first year of the Bachelor of Science in Nursing program. The materials in this course represent a component of a four year integrated BSN program.

COURSE PROCESS:

Learners in nursing practice settings continue to learn about professional nursing practice, critical thinking and critical reflection. Practice experiences are supported by seminars, which provide opportunities to examine theories and concepts for discussion, exploration and integration. Praxis involves the examination of the dynamic interplay between theory and practice. Praxis is actualized by critical reflection, journaling and active participation in nursing practice seminars. Practice experiences provide opportunities for participants to develop clinical decision-making skills with contextual awareness.

Learners engage in a variety of learning activities. Some activities occur in the homes of families, or in community agencies or organizations that provide resources for healthy people. In the nursing laboratory, learners have opportunities to develop health assessment skills that enable them to provide safe nursing care.
