This practice experience provides learners with the opportunity to integrate theory from all courses into the role of the Practical Nurse in the acute care setting and other practice areas as appropriate. Learners will focus on clients with exacerbations of chronic illness and/or acute illness across the lifespan and will consolidate knowledge and skills such as: post-operative care, surgical wound management, intravenous therapy, focused assessment and clinical decision-making in acute care settings.

**Program Information:** This course is one of six courses required in Level 4 of the Practical Nursing program. Satisfactory completion of this course is required to complete the program.

- practice within relevant legislation, Entry-Level Competencies for Licensed Practical Nurses (BCCNM, 2021), Scope of Practice: Standards, Limits, Conditions for Licensed Practical Nurses (BCCNM, 2022), Professional Standards for Licensed Practical Nurses (BCCNM, 2020), and Practice Standards for Licensed Practical Nurses (BCCNM, current editions), the Nurses (Licensed Practical) Regulation (2020), and facility specific policies and procedures;
- provide culturally informed, safe, competent, and ethical care to clients experiencing medical or surgical challenges;
- independently apply critical thinking, clinical judgment, and knowledge of assessment to plan, implement and evaluate the agreed upon plan of care for stable post-operative or medical clients across the lifespan;
- independently implement nursing interventions and make practice decisions that are client specific and consider client acuity, complexity, variability, and available resources;
- recognize and respect the roles and ability of other members of the health care team in the acute care setting;
- recognize changes in client status and collaborate with other members of the health care team to develop a plan of care;
- provide a caring environment for clients and families by connecting, sharing and exploring with them in a collaborative relationship;
- deliver culturally informed, trauma informed, relational care that recognizes and respects the uniqueness of each individual and is sensitive to culture and diversity;
- demonstrate teaching and learning through a continuum of care and discharge planning;
- provide leadership, direction, assignment, and supervision of unregulated care providers in the acute care setting;
- advocate for and lead change reflective of evidence-informed practice;
- identify how interactions with clients and other members of the health care team are influenced by own biases, values and assumptions; and
- seek out and engage in continuous learning to maintain and enhance competence.
