GENERAL COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Students will learn practical skills in white water raft guiding for personal trips to prepare themselves for employment in the commercial white-water raft guiding industry. Students will continue to work on the white-water raft handling skills and experience that they developed in the Raft Guide Skills Level 1 course. Students will learn on the upper glacier-fed waters of the Kicking Horse River, and other Rocky Mountain rivers around Golden, BC. At the conclusion of this course, students will have the opportunity to challenge the BCROA (BC River Outfitters Association) Oar Guide Exam.

Program Information: This course is an elective course of the ATBO Program. When this course is taken in conjunction with ATBO 230 Swift Water Rescue, and ATBO 135 Raft Guide Skills Level 1, it can lead to professional certification as a white water raft guide with the BCROA (BC River Outfitters Association).

- identify and understand river dynamics;
 - identify and utilize all rafting equipment, related safety gear and equipment;
 - demonstrate river rescue techniques and self-rescue techniques; and
 - maneuver the raft in up to class 3 water, using oar and paddle strokes.
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COURSE TOPICS:

- Personal clothing and safety gear
- River safety briefings, trip leadership
- Raft and gear rescues in white water
- Dealing with emergency scenarios
- Reading white water, scouting rapids, picking a line
- Oar and Paddle guide maneuvering in class 2 and 3 white water

OPTIONAL COURSE TOPICS:

- River expedition meal planning, packing, and field cooking
- Expedition camp skills
- Challenging the BCROA Guide Exam (written and practical)
