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#### GENERAL COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course provides insight into the architecture, components, and operations of routers and ethernet switches in a small routed network. Students learn how to configure routers and switches for more advanced functions. Topics include static and dynamic routing, virtual LANs (VLAN), virtual trunking, inter-VLAN routing, Network Address Translation (NAT), Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP), port security, standard access control lists, and device discovery protocols. Students work with both IPv4 and IPv6 addressing and subnetting.

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**Program Information:** This course is required for the first year of the Autonomous Systems technician program.

  - activate and configure Routing Information Protocol (RIP);
  - implement IPv6 functionality including static routing, dynamic routing via RIPng, and DHCPv6;
  - implement secure remote access to routers and switches using Secure Shell (SSH);
  - configure Virtual Trunking Protocol (VTP) parameters;
  - design and implement VLANs and inter-VLAN routing;
  - configure NAT for IPv4; and
  - troubleshoot and verify the operation of a small routed network.
